Long-Term Visas now available to digital nomads

Executive summary

Effective 28 June 2023, digital nomads who are nationals of specific countries and work in IT or STEM fields, and their family members, are eligible to obtain Czech Long-Term Visas.

Background

In general, the term "digital nomads" refers to individuals who are employed and receive salaries and benefits in one country (i.e., the home country) but work remotely from another country (i.e., the host country). Digital nomads are typically not permitted to earn remuneration in the host country.

Key developments

On 28 June 2023, the Czech government introduced Digital Nomads, a new program for nationals of Australia, Canada, Japan, New Zealand, South Korea, Taiwan, the UK and the US who work in IT (information technology) or STEM (science, technology, engineering, mathematics) fields and seek to enter the Czech Republic as digital nomads for long-term stays (i.e., more than 90 days). Applicants may qualify as digital nomads under two categories:

- Those who are employed by a company outside the Czech Republic and work remotely from within the Czech Republic can apply for a Long-Term Visa for "Other" Purposes.
- Those who provide IT services to entities on a freelance basis from within the Czech Republic, based on a Czech trade licence, can apply for a Long-Term Visa for "Business."

Individuals who meet all requirements and register for the Digital Nomads program will be issued an appointment for submitting their Long-Term Visa application at the Czech embassy or consulate in their country of citizenship or residence. These applications will be eligible for expedited processing and are expected to be processed within 45 days from the date of submission.

Qualifying family members (i.e., spouses or common-law partners and children) of digital nomads can also register for the program and apply for Long-Term Visas for "Family" Purposes at the same time as the principal applicant.

Impact on employers

The Czech Republic joins a growing list of countries that have introduced visas and permits for digital nomads and remote workers following the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic. Non-Czech employers that allow teleworking may consider the Czech Republic as a potential destination for their employees who are seeking to work remotely.
